WIOA NATIONAL FARMWORKER JOBS PROGRAM (NFJP)

What is UMOS? UMOS is a nonprofit advocacy organization that provides programs and services which improve the employment, educational, health, and housing opportunities of underserved populations.

What is the NFJP? It is a WIOA program that helps eligible migrant and seasonal farmworkers and their family members get education and training, improve job skills, obtain good-paying jobs with benefits, and/or advance in agricultural careers. And, it is **FREE**. Veterans receive priority services.

How do I qualify? You may qualify for the NFJP if you meet **all** of the following:

- ◆ You are legally authorized to work in the United States.
- ◆ You have done farm work in the last two years (e.g., work with crops, Christmas trees, nursery, dairy, fishery, poultry or other related farm work).
- ◆ Your family is low income (e.g., receives public assistance or is un/under employed).
- ◆ If you are male and 18 years old or older, you are registered with the Selective Service.

Your family members may qualify, too!!

What services does the NFJP provide? The NFJP offers Career and Training Services that may help you enroll into a short-term job training or college program and pay for class tuition. You may even be able to receive a stipend while you are attending school.

Services also include assistance with creating a resume, practicing interview skills, looking for and finding a job, accessing supportive services, and staying employed for the long term.

It sounds too good to be true, have others been successful?

Trevor ~ At 19 years old, he wanted a better job than working on and off on a dairy farm. UMOS helped him get certified as a Heavy Equipment Operator. He is now happy to be working at an excavation company making \$16.50 per hour.

Sergio ~ This father of three liked working at a tree nursery but \$14/hour was not enough to support a household of five. He enrolled in UMOS' NFJP which paid for Sergio to complete a 4-week Commercial Driver's License (CDL) training. After getting his CDL, his employer promoted him to a driving position starting at \$17/hour.



What kinds of job training can I get? You can get short-term training in many different career fields, including health care work, heavy equipment operation, commercial truck driving, welding, information technology, *and more*.

Each of these occupations pays good wages, and they are in high demand with lots of available job openings.
